You do NOT need to provide insurance or a SSN to receive a COVID-19 vaccine.

You cannot be denied a vaccine if you don't have insurance or a Social Security number (SSN). Contact a local community-based organization or your health department if you need more information on state ID requirements.

02

The COVID-19 vaccine is FREE for everyone in the United States.

Providers cannot charge you for the vaccine, nor charge you for any administration fees, copays, or coinsurance.
